Authority, Emotion, and Exclusion

A Group Relations Conference and Screening Series in Philadelphia

In a moment defined by our collective inability to transcend simplistic conflict, the project of witnessing and reckoning with difference in groups is of the upmost urgency. This is a time to train a difficult but crucial skill: an ability to witness our social dynamics, and to speak to what we see. In speaking to even our most uncomfortable feelings and observations, we learn that the world does not fall apart, and instead accounts more fully for its complexity. The Authority, Emotion, and Exclusion project trains these skills for people involved in some way in shaping institutions of higher learning.

Institutions of higher learning often ignore the inequities that exist within their walls. These institutions like to imagine themselves as immune to the complex social realities that exist in their broader contexts. We know this is not true. The many overlapping communities that constitute a University or College are structurally entangled with one another, yet socially partitioned. Often, these divisions occur along class lines.

We call administrators, staff, students, professors, and neighbors that collectively make up our institutions of higher learning in Philadelphia to join together in a two-day Group Relations conference in the Tavistock tradition. We seek participants from all corners of the University so that we can collectively address something we know and rarely grapple with: that we are all reliant on and responsive to one another. This event invites participants to witness our personal and structural relationships, and in this witnessing, to experiment with how we can affect social change.

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October 4, 2018:

Bloody Beans Directed by Narimane Mari

7:00 pm, Meyerson Hall B1 (basement)

Drawing from a long history of reflexive anthropological filmmaking, Algerian born director Narimane Mari Benamer conscripts a gaggle of children for an unorthodox collaboration. The game is to re-enact the Algerian Civil War of Independence, and the children concoct a menacing, dreamlike sequence of events, culminating the in the kidnapping of a French soldier.

October 24, 2018:

SymbiopsychotaxiplasmDirected by William Greaves

7:00 pm, Lightbox Film Center

Foregrounding the absurdity of the filmmaking process, William Greaves directs a stale scene between a husband and wife. Meanwhile, a documentary crew films the process of shooting, and yet a third crew films the entire tableau. As the ensemble attempts to interpret Greaves' vague directions, the crew mutinies, and continues to document everything (including their disobedience)



November 16, 2018:

Ghost Hunting Directed by Raed Andoni

7:00 pm, Meyerson Hall, B1 (Basement)

Director Read Andoni assembles a team of fellow Palestinians who have been detained by the Israeli Defense Forces, many in the same detention center in the West Bank. They collaborate on the design and reconstruction, from memory, of the interior of the detention center where they were detained. The actors role-play as their past selves and as the Israeli guards who imprisoned, tortured, and interrogated them.



December 8, 2018: Shorts 7:00 pm, Meyerson Hall, B1 (Basement)

Blue Tape by Kathy Acker and Alan Sondheim

Sondheim and Acker perform a series of experiments on one another, testing how sexual desire and stimulation effect their attention and thought processes. (54 min)



In his distinctive observational style, Faroki brings us into a venture capital negotiation, in which the roles are defined and the outcome depends on the players ability to maneuver within the rules of their occupation. (50 min)

Twenty-eight strangers share a room on day three of a Group Relations Conference in Chicago, shortly after Donald Trump was elected president. They discuss their emergent interpersonal dynamics while a film crew documents them. Waves of hostility, humor, suspicion, and pain shake the group as the identities and histories of the participants are uncovered in real time.
